

Hodgetts Timeline: Further Afield

My searches have concentrated on the Midlands in the earliest period and tightened to Dudley from the 1600s. These Hodgetts references were collected incidentally.

Some time afterwards Roger de Bernevall recovered possession of the manor, and was seised of it at his death in battle in 1226, when the custody of his lands was granted to Robert Haget, his wife's brother. Six years later, however, on 2 October 1232, the sheriff of the county was ordered to give seisin of the manor to Reginald de Bernevall, brother of Roger, on condition that he recompensed Robert for the loss of his chattels, and in addition paid him £5 a year for the support of the heirs of Roger until they attained their majority. However, on 27 October in the same year Robert Haget recovered his right of custody."ⁱⁱ
